Your word, O LORD, is eternal; it stands firm in the heavens. Your faithfulness continues through all generations; you established the earth, and it endures. Your laws endure to this day, for all things serve you. If your law had not been my delight, I would have perished in my affliction. I will never forget your precepts, for by them you have preserved my life. Save me, for I am yours. ~ Psalm 119, 89-94

The Feast of Pentecost is one of the most important celebrations in the Old Testament. The Lord had led His people Israel out of Egypt, out of slavery into freedom. Fresh in their memories were the wonderful acts with which God had delivered them: the plagues, the death of the first born, the Passover meal, the deliverance through the waters of the Red Sea. Now they were camped at the foot of Mount Sinai. What was next?

Seven weeks into their wandering, the Lord spoke to His chosen people. As a newly liberated people, they received God's law, which He would inscribe on stone tablets. This was the day of Pentecost (meaning "fiftieth day"). In the days of the Temple, this day also celebrated the first harvest of the year, when the first fruits of the fields were dedicated to the Lord.

We, living in the Church Age, remember the Resurrection of our Lord Jesus, only a few weeks ago. We too remember the mighty acts by which He has led us out of slavery to sin, and into freedom in Christ: The wounds, the death of the Father's Only-Begotten, the gift of the Lord's Supper, the deliverance and new birth through the waters of the Baptismal Font. Now we share in Christ's resurrection and have the promise of eternal life. What next?

Like the Israelites before us, we must follow God's law so that we will not fall back into sin and become slaves again. The Feast of Pentecost celebrates the founding of the Church on earth, when newly redeemed Christians were given the law—this time not written on tablets of stone, but on tablets of flesh: human hearts. It also commemorates for us the first great harvest of the Church, when Peter and the apostles, filled with the Holy Spirit, brought into the barn of the Church a harvest of 3000 newly baptized Christians—men and women in whom God planted a seed, and who grew to maturity. All this was possible not because of the disciples own strength or wisdom or ability, but because of God's own Spirit who was given to them and by whom they allowed themselves to be changed to see the world with new eyes and to be able to speak to the world with a new voice.

God has saved us by delivering us from our sins! He rose from the dead to give to us eternal life! It is out of appreciation of love that we follow Him, and we know His law is good because it will keep us from losing the freedom He won for us. During this festival, as we conclude our 50-day-long Easter celebration, we will explore how empowered by the Holy Spirit we can show our gratitude to the Lord for the freedom He has given us. We will share the fruits of the Spirit which are God's gifts to us.

May God bless you and help you to appreciate His gifts to you. May we rejoice in the law He gives, that we might enjoy the freedom He has won for us!

Invisible By Michael Welch

I am blessed to be in possession of three beautiful paintings. They are hanging in our home and painted by a very well know artist. One is actually signed to the Welch family. They were painted by my grandfather. The one that was signed I had to buy. I had to buy it because he wanted to teach me a lesson. At the time I had recently started a business as a professional photographer and I had explained to him that I had done my first wedding for nothing in order to put together an album that I could use as a portfolio to show to prospective clients. The principle he was teaching me is this, that if I think my work is worth nothing, then everyone else would think it is worth nothing. He also said that supporting charitable works is important, but do it with the income that your business produces, otherwise there will be no business, no income and you will be unable to support the causes that are important to you.



The painting that I paid for is the most precious to me, not because of its monetary value, not even its artistic composition, but because of the lesson it taught me. My Grandfather was a very generous man and it would have been very easy for him to just give me the painting, but my character and principles by which I lived were more important to We all have artifacts that we have acquired over the years that serve to remind us of the past events that were so meaningful in our lives. Their monetary valve has long since faded: a worn photo; a vase; a lamp; a flower pressed between the leaves of a book; or a piece of jewelry, but some how they disappear from view. They are right in front of us

in plain sight, but we do not see them. They have become invisible. Then we have a guest and they say what a beautiful painting and it is as if we ourselves are seeing it for the first time and the history, emotions and the events surrounding it all come to life once again.

Is this not what happens with our relationships with family, friends and members of our congregations? Do we sometimes become invisible to one another? Then some life transition occurs. A baptism, and we think I remember when the father was baptized, or I remember the church picnic, when so and so caught that huge bass. I remember the encouragement given to me by his wife before she passed. Over time these relationships tend to fade like paintings on a wall until they are rekindled by the events in our lives.

This happens because we become comfortable in our daily routine until it is disrupted by some life altering event, and then what that person has done for us is brought to the light. The event is reborn in our hearts.

Does this not happen with our relationship with our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. Has He become invisible in our own lives as the crucifix hanging over our beds. Are we so comfortable in our own lives that He disappears until some life altering event, which causes us to remember what He has done for us in the past. We are reminded of His Faithfulness and His love and He is reborn in our lives.

Just as we should not take for granted the love of Christ, let us think about the sweetness of our lives and all those who we have laughed and cried with, and those who have nourished us along the way. Let us not wait for that life altering event to rekindle those memories. Let us share them and the love of Christ while we are still able. Let us not remain invisible. challenge for you all. Over the coming month share with those you encounter something that they had done for you over the years and how much it meant to you. In doing so we may rediscover the value of our lives and transform the invisible to the visible.
