
Holy Trinity Lutheran Church Newsletter November 2015 104 West Main Street, Stafford Springs, Connecticut 06076



Someone said to me recently that they found a quote where Luther says that God is foremost the God of the weak and powerless. They asked, "What on earth does this mean?!"

To put it in a bit more modern language, Christianity is a religion for people that the world thinks are losers. Why? Because we don't value the same things they do. Christianity is countercultural. It's radical. It loves those whom the world hates, those whom the world has no use for. Those that the world thinks are unproductive. And it takes no pride or consolation in fame or fortune.

And when the church forgets that, when people forget that, we need to return to the root of our faith. It's time for us to look at the cross and get a reality check of how weak and out of touch the world can be. And how shallow the world actually is when we experience the abundance of life in Jesus and fullness of relationships by living according to Jesus example For this reason the Holy Spirit, Jesus' own promised spirit is given to us in Baptism and every time we invite him in through the reception of the word and of the sacraments.

That's why we worship, that's why we receive the gifts of grace, the Body and Blood of Christ, the washing of regeneration, the forgiveness of sins- to be present in this world of truth. To abide in the Word of truth that God alone gives. That's how we become more like Jesus.

We are reformed, the church is reformed, the world is reformed when we fix our gaze on the perfect love that is Christ crucified. There our vision is arrested and all our focus is placed on our God. And if we but keep our eyes on Jesus—if we just keep our eyes on Jesus, we find that the things we have enslaved ourselves to and that the devil tempts and teases us with just don't matter. Beneath the cross we have no choice but to look up and away from our bellies and shelves that we've been obsessed with filling and we realize we all are equal and all are loved by the one who did not withhold his own life for us sinners.

We obsess as a culture over being independent. So many aspire to be a self made man, being told to pull yourself up by your bootstraps. But then again there are also many who simply can't and who become fixated on the opposite extreme and obsess over their victimhood and learn to love just as narrowly as those who only esteem success.

God teaches us a different kind of love in Christ. He gives us a different kind of dependence that teaches us appreciation for unconditional love rather than resentment for what we or others have or have not.

Only the truth can free us. Only the truth liberates us from the illusions and obsessions of our dissatisfaction or the vain promises of a world that takes advantage of human longing. We are a community dedicated to speaking truth. To boldly proclaiming what humanity is, what humanity needs, and that our God is great and our God is faithful.



Reciprocity By Michael S. Welch

Jesus teaches whatever we want we must first give it up. If we want to save our life we must first give it to the Lord. If we want money we must deny ourselves the use of it. If we want time we must first be willing to give it up, so we can earn it in the future. If we want to live we must die daily. If we want to grow our congregation we have to be willing to give up control, and that's the scary part. This is called reciprocity.



Sometimes are perception of our young people as children even into there twenties and thirties remains unchanged. I have constantly over the past 40 years been trying to explain to my family I am not the same guy that shot my little brother between the eyes during a bee bee gun war. (This was before the movie) We as parents and aunts and uncles have witnessed every foolish thing that our children nephews and nieces have done. Sometimes it takes an outsider with a different perspective to point out how much they have grown into responsible adults. For me this occurred when my then 16 year old son asked me to drop him off for work at Valley Hobby in Simsbury. As we pulled up to the store Ian reached into his pocket and pulled out a ring of keys. I asked, are you opening this morning and he said "Greg, the owner, went to visit his mother in florida, who was sick and that he was managing the store for the next 2 weeks." I was stunned. Here I am, his father, worried about leaving him alone for a weekend when a stranger was willing to place

his livelihood in my son's hands, not to mention the million dollar antique train collection housed in the store.

If we are not willing to place our trust in our children they will seek council elsewhere. They will go where they are accepted and recognized for their true qualities, which we are often blind to. Could that be why our children even those in their 40's and 50's are not attending church anywhere. We wonder why new members and younger members don't have the same level of commitment that our older members have. We often hear it said "how come they won't take ownership of a job or task, after all I've been peeling the potatoes for the church dinner for 50 years". The reason is we haven't let anyone else do it. What makes something

yours? In days of old when all things were held in common and you were walking a long and spotted an apple tree, you could walk up to it and pick as many apples as you could carry. Anyone could do this. Now you're walking along and someone comes up to you and says "give me your apples. You might say no these are my apples, if you want some apples go and pick them yourself. What made them your property? You attached your labor to it. That is what made it yours. If we want to grow we need to allow others to work in order for them to take ownership and deepen their commitment. We need to teach them how and stand back. We must not only trust in them, we must encourage them and be open to new and different ways of doing things.

We demonstrate our trust in them when we support dinners and events that they stage for the benefit of our congregation. That means our physical presence must be there, because they want so much for us to see what they are doing. They long for you to experience what they are doing. Do you not remember as a child calling your parents and saying look what I did. Well this will never change. Don't we ourselves wonder what our departed parents would say about all that we have accomplished. We can say this is how we did it, but you can do the job any way you want as long as it gets done. We then can marvel at how ingenious and creative they are.

This is what will bring us confidence in the future and peace. When they know we have confidence in them they will seek us out when they are in need of council. They will invite some friends to be on their team and they may not belong to our church! This is a way to attract new members. They are investing their labor into the organization before they become members and when they do join they already feel at home and part of a team. Our task is to learn a job, do our job, teach our job and give our job away, so we can grow into another job. Just keep repeating the cycle. Be the servant. We need to guide not dictate. *To rejoice in your labor; this is the gift of God* (Ecc.5:19). Not allowing someone to work is denying them one of Gods gifts. Amen.
