Dear Sisters and Brothers,

Last week, I experienced a sad and strange first. A young woman named Dawn was hit by a car and killed; her ex-boyfriend, the driver, was arrested for the crime. What connects me to this tragedy is the brief but important role I was blessed to play in her life. Dawn is the first person to die that I baptized. This “first” has led me to reflect this week on baptism, and I invite you in this message to do the same.

Dawn came to me while I was vacancy pastor in Trumbull and asked to be baptized. In the course of our preparation meetings, we discussed many things. One of them- a tangent- was how in the early centuries of the church, when adult baptisms were the norm, baptismal fonts were large stone pools, often in the shape of a cross, that one would step down into to be baptized. Stepping down into the baptismal pool would have felt like stepping down into one’s grave. It is there that the Old Adam, our old sinful nature, is drowned, and when we emerge from the waters, we are reborn. These movements adorning the Sacrament of Baptism help us to perceive our involvement in the Paschal mystery of Jesus’ own dying and rising. Very often, I sometimes feel, when a baby is baptized in the small bowl of water that sits in our beautiful

baptismal fonts, we are caught up in the “cute” factor, and don’t fully appreciate the mystical reality that in that water we die and are brought to new Life.



To my surprise, Dawn asked me, “Well... can we do that?” We built a temporary baptismal pool out of concrete blocks in the entryway to the church, in the shape of a cross, and processed out as a congregation to the place of baptism. The two deacons helped her into the pool, and when we stood up, having been washed in the Name of the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, she was anointed and put on the same white alb that assisting ministers wear—the symbol of being clothed with Christ and mark of all the baptized.

When word came to me of Dawn’s death, I couldn’t help but think of the conversations we had about her death. Not the unexpected death that would kill her body two years later, but the death of sin that would take place in the waters of Baptism—the death that would make her truly alive and give her eternal life. It is an awe-filling thing to know personally that someone is with Christ in heaven because I was there to pour water on her head when Christ washed away her sins.

How do we consider baptism? I can’t think of a single person among us who doesn’t like baptisms. But what is baptism? Luther writes in the Small Catechism, “Baptism works forgiveness of sin, delivers from death and the devil, and gives eternal salvation to all who believe this, as the words and promises of God declare.” Baptism means “that the old Adam in us should be drowned by daily contrition and repentance, and that all its evil deeds and desires be put to death. It also means that a new person should daily arise to live before God in righteousness and purity forever.” Your baptism changes everything.

Luther found such great solace in his baptism, he invoked it against his enemies, against spasms of depression, against assaults of the devil. When he felt inadequate to a task set before him, or feared that God could not love a sinner like him, he would say, “*Baptizatus sum!*” “I am baptized!” Baptism was for him both comfort and strength, as we pray it may be for us.

It’s easy to think on baptism as a family ritual—something to “get done” and an excuse to have a party. But having our children baptized is not something we do for grandma and grandpa, or for my spouse. In fact, baptism is not something we do at all! Rather it is the gift of God, which the church eagerly gives to all who wish to be joined to Christ forever.

It's easy to think on baptism as an initiation ritual—the way to church membership, or a naming ritual. But it is so much more. In baptism we are truly joined to Christ. We truly share in Christ's death and resurrection in a wonderful mystery made sure by God's own promise concerning it. And being adopted as God's daughters and sons, we have the assurance that we will inherit with Christ life everlasting.

Baptism is a matter of life and death. When those we see baptized are often babies who will live another 70, 80, 90 years, we may well lose sight of that. But baptism is not an insurance policy either. It is the beginning of life in Christ—a life that will be realized and assumed into the bliss of God's heavenly presence we know not when. But for those of us who love Jesus, let us hurry to be joined to be joined to Him. And we who are already joined to Christ let us take seriously that our eternal life has already begun. We are joined to Christ and freed from our sins so that just as Christ was raised from the dead we too might live a new life.


Annual Harvest Sale
