"Upon this rock I will build my Church, and the gates of hell will not prevail against it."

Dear Sisters and Brothers,

Jesus promises that the gates of hell will not prevail against his Church. But what exactly does that mean? Often the image of the church build on a rock, a fortress against which the waves of invaders and of storm crash to no avail is the image that immediately comes to mind when we reflect on this verse. The Church, a place of refuge and safety, is however much more than that. Her mission is one that she shares with Jesus, her divine Spouse, and one that forbids her from being stationary!

When Jesus speaks these words to the disciples, Simon Peter has just made a profound profession of faith in an unusual place. Peter declares Jesus to be "the Christ, the Son of the living God," perhaps only a stone's throw from one of the most infamous pagan temples in the Holy Land. Cesarea Phillipi, the location of this Gospel encounter was home to a pagan temple dedicated to the pagan god Pan, a mischief maker associated with the underworld. The deep cave at the site was considered by some to be the portal to Hades. A video detailing this place and its history is accompanying this message. It is near this place that Jesus praises Simon Peter's confession of faith saying that it is on the solid rock of this confession that His church will be built. But what about those gates of hell?

Jesus says that the gates of hell will not prevail against it. Gates, in the ancient world, were a critical part of any city's fortification. They were the most vulnerable point during siege, and if the gates could prevail against an enemy, the city would be safe. However the city in question in this discourse is hell. And the invaders? Christ and his Church! When we celebrate the Paschal mystery at Easter we reflect on Jesus' conquering work on the cross. In the crucifixion our Lord is not a victim, but rather he is the Victor, and his victory is over sin, death, and the devil, whose impressive stronghold has been broken down. We profess this amazing event in perhaps unimpressive words when we confess in the creed "he descended into hell." Christ, having died, descended to hell to break down the gates that hold humanity imprisoned. Having risen from the dead, he leads the captives to freedom.

When Jesus speaks of the gates of hell not prevailing against His Church, it is a promise to us. When we share in His work of liberating, of freeing those imprisoned to sin and death, we are assured a victory because it is Christ who leads us. We live in a time of surprising discord and strife in our country and our world. Is the Church's witness in the face of the sins of racism, greed, hatred, lust, and other injustices to be only a silent one? We are called throughout Scripture to defend and to lift up the lowly and to preach Good News to the oppressed. It's wishing thinking to think this can be done from a safe distance. Jesus describes a spiritual warfare, one that wages around us and in us—whether we choose to participate in it or not. But in the strong rock of the Church, Jesus promises that when we share in His work, when we bring the Good News of victory in Christ to others in word and in action, we are assured that evil will not prevail. With such a calling and such an assurance, we must be bold to push forward with Jesus, whom we, with Peter, confess to be the Christ, the Son of the living God.

In Genesis 24, the matriarch Rebekah (an ancestor of Jesus) was blessed by her sisters who said to her, "May your descendants possess the gates of their enemies." In Christ, this blessing has been fulfilled. But it is not the gates of an earthly city that Christ has taken control of. Neither is it a spiritual enemy that Rebekah's Descendant has defeated. Christ has won for us an eternal conquest, and so in Him, if we fight for what He died, and what He loves, we are assured eternal victory with Him.
