#### Dear Sisters and Brothers,

Last week I had lunch with a gentleman from town who recounted how years ago, you couldn't do business in town unless you were a registered democrat. He said to me, "When we moved to Stafford, I registered as a republican. You know why? Because I love an underdog."

Everybody loves the underdog. It's part of our American mythos, I think Our stories and folk tales, our super-hero comics and movies and sports fandoms love cheering for someone who has come up from behind. "A real Cinderella story!" we like to say. Everyone cheers for the But being the underdog. underdog doesn't always feel so good. In a society that measures success by size and convenience. We're often encouraged to think that we have a right to the picture-perfect life and community, but little challenged to grow where we are planted.



When we chase after some picture-perfect life, we obscure the fact that God measures success not by size, not by perfection, but by faithfulness.

The idea that others have it better than us is an age-old trick of the devil to keep us focused on ourselves and not others.

The idea that things were better in "the good old days" is a lie the devil tells us to try and keep us from living fully right now. Too many marriages, fortunes, property, relationships, and yes —even churches, have been sacrificed because we think that someone else's stuff is better than ours.

King Solomon in the wonderful sermon called Ecclesiastes, warns us about "the-grass-isalways-greener syndrome" (chapters 6-8). What the world considers prosperity isn't always good for us. What the world considers adversity isn't always bad. Our Lord Jesus himself warns us not to judge as the world does, but to judge the way God judges. Jesus reminds us that appearances are not always what they seem, in a vivid image: "Who to you scribes and Pharisees! You are like whitewashed tombs. They appear beautiful from the outside, but inside they are full of dead bones" (Matthew 23:27). Jesus isn't telling us that behind everything that looks ideal is hypocrisy, but he gives us a serious warning—don't judge based on what is on the outside.

Whether we have it easy or have it hard, whether we have a lot or a little, whatever we have comes from God's hands. The goal of being a Christian isn't to be poor, or small, or an underdog, but part of being a Christian is realizing that God is the God of the weak, of the dirty, of the lonely, of those on the margins. God raises up the lowly. God loves an underdog. The great King David was the underdog in his battle with Goliath: a small shepherd boy with a sling and a stone standing before a giant in armor. His own family thought so little of David that when the prophet Samuel came to visit Jesse and his sons, they left the runt of a boy out in the fields. It wasn't the strong or the popular or the smartest son who God chose, though. It was the faithful one. "The Lord said to Samuel, 'Do not consider his appearance or his stature... the Lord does not look at the things people look at. The Lord looks at the heart'" (1 Samuel 16:7).

How many such examples do we have in Scripture! Joseph the youngest, hated by his brothers. Moses, an ousted prince with a stutter. Ruth a foreigner, outside of Israel. Gideon, "the weakest in Manasseh and least in his father's house." Peter, who denied the Lord. Thomas, who doubted. Paul who called himself "the chief of sinners." All these and more were nothing in the eyes of people, but great in the eyes of God and faithful in adversity.

Our God does great things with exactly the people that the world has given up on. Our call, our mission, our challenge, is to not give up on God. To thank him for all we have, and to ask for the gifts of faithfulness, of patience, and of love.

Sometimes we might feel week. Sometimes we might feel small. Sometimes we might feel insignificant. And that's no fun. Sometimes it's no fun to feel like an underdog. But God loves an underdog, and sees them through to victory.
